BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION:

The State of California through the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) administers a local assistance program that helps fund various transportation projects. This program provides funding to pay for a portion of the construction cost of eligible projects. In Pacifica's case these projects come in the form of street rehabilitation and overlay projects. This project will also be funded by the Proposition 1B (Prop1B) Local Streets and Roads Improvement, Congestion Relief, and Traffic Safety Account Funds.

The FY 2007-2008 Pavement Rehabilitation Project consist 2-inch asphalt overlay, pavement grinding, base repair, traffic striping, markings and markers and other miscellaneous work. The streets to receive overlay are as follows:

Sharp Park Road, from Highway 1 to Gypsy Hill Road
Terra Nova Boulevard, from Victoria Way to Everglades Drive
Oddstad Boulevard, from Park Pacifica Avenue to Big Bend Drive
Linda Mar Boulevard, from Peralta Road to Hermosa Avenue

The plans and specifications were done by the Engineering Division and staff requests authorization to advertise for sealed bids the FY 2007-2008 Pavement Rehabilitation Project.

SUBJECT:

Purchase of Structural Firefighting Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

ORIGINATED BY:

North County Fire Authority

DISCUSSION:

The North County Fire Authority purchased structural firefighting Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) in 2003 primarily from grant funding through the FEMA Fire Assistance program. This purchase replaced equipment which had been in-service for many years. At that time it was recognized that there would need to be on-going periodic replacement of this equipment and that the cost would be substantial. The North County Fire Authority established replacement funding accounts within each agency cities budget to provide for this planned need.

The replacement schedule reflects the national standards for structural firefighting Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), which sets a maximum use of ten years from date of manufacture. The standard recognizes that there are two criteria for retirement of PPE, which is ten years from date of manufacture or excessive wear, which ever comes first. Firefighters are issued two sets of structural firefighting personal protective equipment to be able to maintain operational readiness at all times. The existing reserve PPE have been in-service for ten or more years and are scheduled for replacement. This purchase would provide all line personnel with a new primary set of PPE and move the existing primary set into reserve status keeping on schedule for maintaining this vital structural firefighting safety equipment in line with established industry standards.

North County Fire Authority is tagging onto and utilizing an existing bid price established by San Francisco Fire Department and making a joint purchase by all fire agencies within North county fire Authority to achieve additional savings. The cost to the City of Pacifica is \$61,053 to be funded from established set aside budgeted money in fund 8 of the Fire Assessment Fund. Additionally, this purchase was reviewed and determined to be necessary and appropriate by the Fire Assessment Committee.

SUBJECT:

Approval of the Streetlight License Agreement between the City of Pacifica and Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E) in Connection with the SmartMeter Program and Authorize the City Manager to Execute the Document

DISCUSSION:

PG&E's SmartMeter Program will enable them to read household and commercial meters without having an actual person to walk the area. The SmartMeter equipment consists of a Data Collector Unit, two antennas, coaxial cable and photovoltaic adaptor. The purpose of this agreement is to allow PG&E to install their equipment on our streetlight pole. Streetlights are not metered and the City pays a fixed cost based on the number of streetlights. Therefore, having this equipment attached to our streetlight does not affect the way the City pays for streetlight electricity consumption. Currently, PG&E is asking for their equipment to be attached at one location only, Humboldt Court near Yosemite.

Staff feels that installing these SmartMeters is beneficial not only to PG&E, but the consumers, the City and the environment as well. Staff recommends approval of the Streetlight License Agreement between the City of Pacifica and Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E) in connection with the SmartMeter Program.

Fiscal impact will be a one-time revenue of \$780.

SUBJECT:

Award of Contract to Peterson Power Systems for the Waukesha Engine Overhaul at Linda Mar Pump Station Project, and Authorize Budget Authority for \$75,000.

ORIGINATED BY:

Wastewater Division

DISCUSSION:

The **WAUKESHA ENGINE OVERHAUL AT LINDA MAR PUMP STATION PROJECT** ("Project") involves a complete overhaul of the Waukesha engine that runs the main sewage pump at Linda Mar Pump Station. This engine has been in operation since the pump station was built in early 1970's. Over the years it has gone thru many repairs and has now reached its course especially after it endured some of the worst storms last winter. Staff contemplated on buying a new engine; however, buying another one will cost about \$300k, while installation will be at a minimum around \$200k in addition to a very long downtime, which is very detrimental to the operation of the pump station. A new pump installation is not only expensive but also difficult, given a very tight working area to remove a very large engine and replace it with a similar size, where there is hardly any room to maneuver to get it inside the building. Therefore, staff is convinced that doing a complete overhaul of the existing engine will be more economical, practical and will require a very short downtime.

Because this is a maintenance and repair of a sanitary sewer facility, the Project can be announced thru informal bid process of sending Request for Proposal to pre-qualified contractors. So on Tuesday, August 26, 2008, staff sent a Request for Proposal to Bay Power LLC/Calcon Systems Inc., Peterson Power Systems and Pacific Power Corporation, pre-qualified contractors who are experts on Waukesha Engines. On Monday, September 15, 2008, two bids were received and they are as follows:

Peterson Power Systems	\$44,320.00
Calcon Systems Inc.	\$79,221.00

The apparent low bidder is Peterson Power Systems. All required documentations were submitted with their bid. In addition staff has verified their listed reference projects and agencies, and the responses were very commendable. Moreover, staff personally interviewed both companies' representatives at a separate time to ensure that both understand the project clearly and had based their proposal accordingly. Staff concludes that Peterson Power Systems is very much qualified and recommends award of contract to the apparent low bidder.

Although the Project's current Scope of Work is to only refurbish the existing Waukesha Engine, staff anticipates additional work will be needed to other aspects of the sewage pump such as the

replacement of the manual oil pump for the oil cooling system because it is currently leaking, and the purchase and installation of a new water softening system, which will be preventive measure to reduce mineral build-ups in the engine and pump. Furthermore, because the repair of a Waukesha engine is a specialized trade, staff will need to retain a special inspector/consultant to oversee that the project is being done correctly.

Construction will begin as soon as the City Council approves the award of contract and budget authority. The contract requires that the Project must be completed before November 30, 2008.

On January 28, 2008, the City Council on their regular meeting approved a budget of \$60,000 for the overhaul of the Waukesha engine. However, staff was not able to bid the project before the end of the last fiscal year, and the budget was not carried over for this fiscal year. Since then, staff discovered additional work to be done as discussed above. The Project will be paid thru the Sewer Facility Construction Fund. A budget authority of \$75,000.00 is needed for the Project.

SUBJECT:

Authorize Staff to Advertise for Sealed Bids the Olympian/Sussex Drainage Improvement Project

ORIGINATED BY:

Wastewater Division / Public Works

DISCUSSION:

The Olympian/Sussex Drainage Improvement Project consists of removing the existing temporary above ground drainage pipes that run from the southern portion of 189 Olympian thru its southern adjacent vacant lot and along the northern portion of 170 Sussex Way that finally discharges unto the existing swale on Sussex Way, and installing a permanent underground drainage system and improving the drainage swale along Sussex Way. Prior to the installation of the temporary drainage system that was approved by the City Council on September 24, 2007, these said properties have been inundated by storm water running open thru their side yards from an existing drainage pipe that ended 10 feet west of the road within the Olympian Way right-of-way, which carried the street runoff of the upper portion of Olympian Way and the watershed along the eastside of Olympian Way from 110 Olympian to 224 Olympian. Years of inundation had eroded the side yards of these properties, and caused tremendous stress to the owners each winter. Staff had worked with the owners to ensure that the final design of the drainage system is acceptable to them. The installation of the permanent drainage system will require Drainage Easements from these three properties, and staff is preparing the necessary documents needed. It is anticipated that the owners will sign these documents prior to start of construction, and staff will present the drainage easement dedication along with the award of contract to the Council next month.

The project will be financed thru the General Fund. Since time is the essence, as soon as Council authorizes staff to advertise for said project, staff will immediately publicize to be able to go back to Council on November 10, 2008 for award of contract approval.

The plans and specifications were done by the Wastewater Division and staff requests authorization to advertise for sealed bids the Olympian/Sussex Drainage Improvement Project.

SUBJECT:

Police Department's final report on July 4, 2008 activities.

ORIGINATED BY:

Police Department

DISCUSSION:

As I mentioned in my initial report with the 4th being on a Friday evening we were preparing for the worst and hoping for the best. The daytime activities went off without a problem. We staffed with the minimum amount of officers and there were no significant incidents.

In preparing for the worst, we decided to add to our staffing this year by requesting assistance from the San Mateo County Sheriff's Office. We asked for and received 18 deputies and two sergeants for the evening and they were teamed up with Pacifica PD officers. We fielded a total of 58 sworn personnel, 38 from Pacifica PD and 20 from the Sheriff's Office, which is the largest contingent of officers in the history of the city.

We had officers on the beaches as we have in the past. We did reduce the number this year, due to the fact that we have the Rhino (four wheel drive all terrain vehicle), which is able to cover a lot of territory in a short time. We used the officers that we moved from the beach to augment our street teams.

The beach teams were very successful in controlling the beaches. We had very few incidents and the beach teams made a total of 6 arrests, which was about the same as last year.

Also, in the past we have tried several tactics to identify the person(s) who are using illegal fireworks. Some tactics have worked and some have not. Two years ago we tried undercover officers who would identify the violator for the uniformed officers to arrest. That turned out to be very dangerous and in fact we had one incident where we had to bring in additional officers because the neighborhood was coming to the violator's defense. Last year we tried a lower key approach, with some undercover work, but it turned out to not be effective. That is why we decided this year to bring in enough staff to be able to post officers at the problem areas.

We believe the plan had some effect on the use of illegal fireworks, but there were some problems identified that we will correct next year. We feel that with some slight changes in our plan, we will have a good handle on the evening.

Our dispatch center received a total of 319 calls for service from July 3rd at midnight through 6 am on the 5th of July. Of those, 119 were fireworks related. This compares to 240 calls for service last year with 141 of them being fireworks related. There were a total of 24 arrests this year, compared to 25 last year. As mentioned earlier, the beach teams made 6 arrests, the special enforcement teams made 13 arrests and the beat units made an additional 5 arrests.

One significant change we noted this year from last is that after midnight on July 4th we only received 12 calls related to fireworks and last year we had over 30 calls.

We also instituted a new administrative fine for this year and we feel this had an impact on the illegal fireworks activity. I heard from several sources that either people did not buy or decided to not use illegal fireworks because of the large fine. We also believe the fog and dampness of the evening contributed to the decrease in activity.

The city has billed a total of \$27,633.70 for the administrative fines issued by the officers. As of Sept. 24, 2008 the city has collected a total of \$16,050.

Overall we felt the evening went much better than years past. Next year the 4th is on a Saturday so we will be preparing with this in mind. We will be making some adjustments to our plan, but for the most it will be similar to this years' as far as the personnel requirements.
